"Should old acquaintance be forgot, and old lang syne?" These familiar New Year's Eve lyrics resonated with the message of former Lake and Hills Garden Club (LHGC) President Fredi Hallman during her presentation at the Club's January 11 meeting: "days gone by" should not be forgotten.

Fredi highlighted some of the key points about the Cherokee Trail trees from her husband's (Harvey Hallman's) booklet, "Cherokee Indian Trail Trees in the Keowee Peninsula." Those strange looking, bent trees you may have seen around Keowee Key and in the surrounding areas of the Upstate were actually created by the Cherokee Indians in the early 1880s as navigation devices to help other Native Americans guide their way. The Cherokees selected a young sapling, usually a white oak, and made a bend as close to a right angle as possible, pointing to the desired location. They supported this first bend with a crutch-like prop from another tree. Then, the Cherokees would make another bend upwards, tying a loop around this second bend and anchoring it to the ground. As a result of the practice, tree trunks grew horizontally in a direction that pointed to specific points along a trail, for example, to neighboring villages, safe havens, and fresh water.

Also at the January meeting, nearly 20 LHGC project and committee chairs described the goals and activities of their various groups, while encouraging fellow Club members to join in the fun. Active Club members definitely help the LHGC achieve its mission to stimulate the knowledge and love of gardening, to aid in the protection of plants and wildlife, and to encourage civic beauty.
