2019 Auction

Susan Hansen, 2019 Auction Chairperson, has been meeting with her committees that are organizing the annual fund raiser to be held on October 28, 2019, at the Club at Keowee Key. The teams are securing items for different raffle baskets and collecting items for assembling the table decorations and centerpieces. The entire club membership is securing those unique things for contribution to the silent auction, as each member is responsible for a contribution valued at a minimum of \$50.

Seneca Healthcare and Rehabilitation Center - Raised Garden Project

Laurie Churchill is leading a team of 19 volunteers to work on the gardens at the Seneca Healthcare and Rehabilitation Center. While originally planning to refurbish the raised garden, members soon learned that much more was needed. Some of the residents had bird feeders outside of their window; however, the feeders appeared very dilapidated and in need of cleaning and repair. Unfortunately, of the 45 birdhouses, only 24 were salvageable. Accordingly, kits were purchased for those that required replacement and for those windows lacking feeders. The team worked with residents to assemble and install the 81 hummingbird, suet, tube, and tray feeders outside of resident's windows. Five bluebird houses assembled with residents and installed on poles with baffles already have bluebirds nesting in them. Brightening the surroundings are the replanted raised bed as well as 28 flower pots. With more than 130 work hours on behalf of LHGC members, the team continues to visit this facility on a weekly basis for maintenance of the project.

After the major work was done, the area qualified for the National Wildlife Federation's Backyard Wildlife Habitat certification. Laurie submitted the application for the award on behalf of the center and it was readily granted.
